Instructions

TRU Price and Initiation Trivia



Supplies

- 1) Dry erase markers for everyone
- 2) LCD Projector
- 3) Dry erase boards or paper covered in plastic
- 4) Timer
- 5) Three volunteers to be official contestants

- 1) Hand out the dry erase markers and dry erase boards in plastic to everyone.
- 2) Explain that as the trivia questions are asked, they should write down their answers and play along.
- 3) Ask for **THREE** contestants.
- 4) Each contestant will pick a question from the screen.
- 5) They can answer themselves or use one of their lifelines. They can only use two lifelines.
- 6) The lifelines are **COPY** or **POLL THE AUDIENCE**.
 - a. Copy = use the answer of someone in the audience (must pick someone and use whatever answer that person has)
 - b. Poll = audience shows their answer to the contestant and they guess based on the results
- 7) Add the points if they get it right, subtract them if they are wrong.
- 8) When a question is picked, set timer (no more than 30 seconds for each player to answer or pick a lifeline).
- 9) Play until all the questions are asked and the contestant with the highest score wins.

How to Use the Price and Initiation Powerpoint

Instructions



- 1) The powerpoint works like a jeopardy board.
- 2) During slide one, explain the rules on page 1 of these instructions.
- 3) Once three contestants have been chosen, proceed to slide two.
- 4) Click on the question that is chosen.
- 5) The powerpoint will take you to the question.
- 6) Flip the timer when you click to the question.
- 7) Once the answer is given, click ANYWHERE on the screen to circle the right answer.
- 8) To return to the grid, click the TRU logo in the corner.
- 9) The questions that have already been done will appear blue.

REPEAT STEPS 4-9

Discussion Questions: Debriefing After Playing “Are You Smarter Than a TRU Teen?”.

Sample Questions...

- 1) Do you think tobacco excise taxes are higher in major tobacco growing states or non-tobacco growing states?
- 2) Why do you think smoking rates are higher in high school than in middle school?
- 3) What is the link between the price of tobacco and the number of young people that use tobacco?
- 4) Who has the power to change the price of tobacco products?
